Guantanamo Detainee back in town after three year odyssey

Galveston native Edward Tallon says he is just happy to be back home after spending the last 3+ years imprisoned at the Guantanamo Bay detention center in Cuba.

Tallon's ordeal began when he was arrested in September of 2006, charged with Unorthodox Behavior - which carries a possible life sentence. During the months he was waiting for trial, Tallon never lost faith that he would be found innocent. In the end, that didn't happen. Instead, the military tribunal dismissed the charge based on "lack of evidence". Tallon was allowed to return home on November 6th.

Prosecutors alleged that Tallon had told another man that "the Bushes must be eliminated." Tallon's court-appointed lawyer says the conversation was taken out of context. He claimed Tallon was discussing yard work with his gardener, and that "the bushes" referred to some plants which were encroaching on a patio area at Tallon's Galveston home.

Agents of the Federal Unit to Combat Terrorism (FUCT) arrested Tallon in a military-style raid on his home in Galveston. A search of the home uncovered duct tape, two cell phones, several batteries, and \$233 in cash. Authorities believe the suspicious items were part of an Al Qaeda cell that planned to sabotage local sewer treatment facilities. FUCT agents say they interrupted the scheme in the planning stages.

The gardener, Felipe Gomez Jr. - who is still being held on related charges - testified on Tallon's behalf. Gomez claims he did yard work for Tallon for several years, and that neither man was ever involved in terrorist activity.

Preacher claims he was there to "counsel" nude teen

A Houston preacher who was caught on television arranging to meet a 13 year-old girl for sex has claimed it was all an innocent mistake.

Ira Baltor, pastor of the Pentecostal Evangelical Reformed Victory church, was caught by the television program "Dateline MS-NBC" in August after he arrived at the West Houston home of what he believed was a young nude girl. After being confronted, Baltor claimed he was there to counsel the girl, and to "introduce her to Jesus".

Police arrested Baltor, and he was later released on bond of \$25,000. He has maintained his innocence, and continues to minister as senior pastor of the Houston "megachurch" he founded in the early 1980s, after he reportedly ran off with a church secretary in Iowa.

In a statement posted on the church website, Baltor adamantly says he will continue to counsel promiscuous young girls, saying he feels that his "duty is to help them, regardless of the legal consequences."

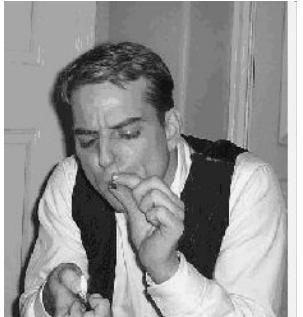
Accused Pothead Held For Contempt

(TEXAS CITY) - When Kenny MacVillers was asked by Galveston County Probation officer Hector Bainell to provide a urine sample, he unzipped his fly and peed all over Bainell's desk. This was the veteran probation officer's first sign of trouble. Things got worse at a hearing in County Court on October 28th.

After hearing a report from the prosecutor, Judge Maxine Proull asked MacVillers if he had anything to say in his own behalf.

MacVillers then stood up and began a rambling and incoherent statement accusing police of ruining his reputation as a marijuana distributor. "They said my pot was low grade dirt weed" he said, "Do you have any idea what that did to my reputation?" Judge Proull admonished MacVillers that this was inadmissible, at which point MacVillers shouted "Blow me, your Honor!". He was then escorted out of the courthouse.

On his way to the jail, MacVillers fell down and gave himself a black eye and several broken ribs, according to a press release provided by the Galveston County Sheriff's office.

Electrician will face battery charge

A Texas City electrician has been arrested and will be charged with battery after an incident in a local hotel. Clyde C. Musterd, 23, of La Marque, told police he was driving by the Azure Motel on I-45 on October 1st, when he noticed his fiancée's Subaru in the parking lot, and looked for his fiancée, 19 year old Lisa Pickels. Musterd at first did not see Pickels, but noticed several men entering and leaving a first-floor room. Wondering what THAT was about, Musterd parked his truck and approached the room, where he could hear his fiancée's voice. He told officers that she sounded as if she was being hurt, or in some type of pain the way she was crying out. Worried, he knocked at the door, but no one opened. He did see someone peeking out through the curtains. This angered him, so he knocked harder. Finally, after several minutes, the door opened, and inside the room Musterd found his fiancée with three men, playing dominos. When Musterd asked why the bed was messed up, one of the men told him "A dog must have come in here and did it". Musterd then punched the man in the nose. This effectively ended the domino game, and police were summoned. Musterd was taken into custody on battery charges, posted bail and was released the same day. Musterd has since apologized to Pickels for his behavior, but LaMarque DA Berger Mayo says charges are still pending.

Local Senior Citizens Paper Wins Award

The Scene Magazine, published monthly in Clear Lake, has been named the third best monthly paper in southern Harris County for the month of October. The award was given to the 6 year-old publication by the Active Seniors Society, Houston Area, Texas (ASSHAT).

The award comes at a time when the editors of the paper are working to transition their target audience from the geriatric 60+ set to a more active, "young" 50+ crowd. It represents the second time the publication has received a major award recently - the first was last year when a recycling drive (Turn Clear Lake Green) named the paper the most commonly recycled paper in Clear Lake. "Many thousands of unread copies are recycled each month, as many as 90% of the papers printed end up in a recycling or trash bins" according to the citation.

Our spy inside parent company BAMMS (Boring Area Monthly Magazine Specialists) said that "They really really want to be cool.
